Marshall Square Garden Appreciation Tour

Garden for a Changing Climate is a community co-created project initiated by artist Jenny Kendler and UIC's Gallery 400. GCC partners with five Chicago community organizations to create plant-based infrastructure which will provide meaningful resilience as our planet warms, systems shift—and perhaps even collapse. Through a series of climate change street fairs, GCC works side-by-side with Chicago residents to envision positive post-climate-change futures—staking out strategies to claim physical and cultural space against the forces of disaster capitalism, preparing our communities to thrive in this rapidly changing climate.

Little Village's Marshall Square is home to many community gardens that bring neighbors together in green spaces where they cultivate plants, share food, and their personal narratives. The Marshall Square Garden Appreciation Tour is a travelling event that celebrates two of the many garden hubs in Marshall Square, Esperanza Health Center and Telpochcalli School's garden and the garden at Hammond Elementary. Participants visit the Esperanza Health Center and Telpochcalli School garden, where they can learn healthy recipes from nutritionist Marjorie Kersten, participate in the Telpochcalli Community Education Project (TCEP) potluck, and create butterfly seed bombs that attract native butterflies. Just a 10 minute walk away, participants will follow a procession bringing tomatillo plants to Hammond Elementary. In Hammond's garden Free Street Theater facilitates storytelling workshops, participants will create monarch-themed buttons, and enjoy garden snacks inspired by the plants present in the garden.

Hammond Elementary School Garden

Hammond Elementary School's Community Garden is a safe place for students and families to gather and relax. It was created with the help of Lincoln Park Zoo and Principal Anamaria Orbe. Families plant, tend, and harvest vegetables and herbs in the garden beds throughout the growing season. Chicago mural artist Gloe is working with Hammond students to create a mural that will cover the garden fence. Chicago metal artist Omar Magana is designing and building a metal shed to store garden tools. The Lincoln Park Zoo holds a Spring Break Camp in the garden, and Gallery 400 is continuing to beautify the garden with handmade planters that double as outdoor benches.

Telpochicalli Garden

Raíces de Esperanza is a community garden in Marshall Square managed by Esperanza Health Centers in partnership with Telpochcalli Elementary and Telpochcalli Community Education Project and surrounding neighbors. The garden is small, but a might amount of food is grown as a means of education and community building. The garden organizers host events and workshops centered around growing and cooking healthy food, learning about our local environment, and creating a safe space to make connections and work together as a community.

Participants are invited to transform Chicago's gardens into hospitable areas for butterflies through the making of seed bombs, balls made of clay, soil, and seeds that can be tossed into gardens to grow plants.

Artist Jenny Kendler facilitates dialogue about the issues we as individuals are PRO for. What are the things we support? What are the groups we want to flourish? Participants are invited to make posters in support of their causes.

Button Making


In celebration of the monarch butterfly, participants create buttons with images of monarch wings and dried flowers.
