Incorporating video, live theatrical performance, and hand-made objects, Universal Declaration of Infantile Anxiety Situations Reflected in the Creative Impulse explores feminist legacies, the symbolism of a maternal order, first loves, and performance collective My Barbarian's personal negotiations as daughters, sons, students, teachers, and working mothers. The central video Working Mother -- in which Gaines, Gordon, and Segade perform with their own mothers as well as artists Eleanor Antin and Mary Kelly-stages playful scenarios that convey both continuity and change in feminist, conceptual artistic, and familial projects.

On two occasions the group performs a live staging of their adaptation of Bertolt Brecht's, The Mother. Telling the story of a working-class mother who becomes increasingly radicalized on the eve of the Bolshevik Revolution, the play centers on the power of the affective maternal relationship to foster social change. Alongside Working Mother and video documentation of the performances, papier-mâché masks and drawings associated with the performance activate the gallery space. The drawings refer alternately to the woodcuts of Mary Cassatt and the drawings of Käthe Kollwitz, whose images of motherhood inform the entire exhibition.
