Forests are metaphors for deep imagination, dreams, and desire; places in which unknown danger and seduction lurk. The trees and foliage in this exhibition mark borders, defend territory, and survey dominions. Burdened with soldiering on behalf of the nation state, they lay claim to land in its name while concealing signs of the mechanized violence that engenders and sustains the state. Within the nation, the onus falls on these trees to determine whose lives will count and whose will not. The art and artifacts on view evoke those trees that battle on behalf of, or have been sacrificed to, the state's cartographic conceit.
