

September 3, 2013—Chicago, IL—Featuring artists Will Benedict, Andy Boot, Tom Humphreys, Lazar Lyutakov, Panos Papadopoulos, Elisabeth Penker, Mandla Reuter, Florian Schmidt, Lucie Stahl, Mladen Stilinović, and Heimo Zobernig. In an exhibition that marks his homecoming to Chicago, curator Michael Scott Hall asks: how do you characterize the artwork of a nation? Or even on a slightly smaller scale: the artwork of a city? In three, overlapping exhibitions, The Program attempts to identify the elusive idea of "Viennese" art by bringing together a variety of artists based in, or connected to, Vienna. Featuring both established and emerging artists working in a variety of media, The Program is what Hall has referred to as "a conceptual gallery on fast-forward." As some works will be removed, and others remain, the show enables a historicizing process of remembering and forgetting earlier versions while looking at the present iteration and anticipating what is to come in the future. This framework provides the audience with an opportunity to see how different artistic positions can be presented and re-contextualized, how patterns form and break, and how new meanings can be produced and re-produced. Hall has further accelerated this idea by arranging exhibitions under the same name at CourtneyBlades in Chicago (September 6-October 4), and ReMap4 in Athens, Greece (September 8-30).
